"Ani B'Ma'arav, Aval Libi B'Mizrach." These enduring words, originating from the eloquent pen of the poet Rabbi Yehuda Halevi nearly a millennium ago, encapsulate a profound resonance within the hearts of the Jewish people. than ever before. As the chill in the air intensifies, it mirrors the encroaching coldness that envelops the world. The external frostiness seems all the more piercing when contrasted against the cold indifference to the shedding of Jewish blood.

The daylight hours recede incrementally, each day growing shorter, and seems to reflect the veiled yet persistent cloud of hate that obscures the sun, making it seemingly impossible to discern a glimmer of hope on the horizon. The world looms in a dark shadow, and as we peer into the uncertain tunnel ahead, the prospect of perceiving any light or warmth seems increasingly elusive.

Yet, in the heart of this enveloping darkness and amidst the biting cold, the Jewish spirit remains unwavering in its faith. "Od Lo Avdah Tikvateinu" — our hope remains undiminished. It is our belief that, even when the divine light appears concealed, it endures, a timeless presence within our souls, resonating with unwavering faith.

Indeed, this conviction encapsulates the essence of Chanukah, a festival coinciding with the darkest and coldest days of the year, often aligned with the winter equinox. While we light a menorah adorned with multiple candles, the central mitzvah, the core requirement, is to kindle a solitary candle. One candle, that's all we need.

Chanukah serves as a poignant reminder that, even in the bleakest of times, a single candle wields the power to dispel the gloom, diffusing warmth and illumination into our lives and the wider world.

And though we stand a month away from Chanukah's arrival, and even when it does come, the menorah graces us with its glow for just eight fleeting days, Jewish tradition bestows a profound and timeless truth. The light emanating from the menorah is but a reflection of the profound, divine light dwelling within each one of us. "Ki Ner Hashem Nishmat Adam" — the candle of God is man's soul. 


