

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Rabbi Meyers' Message

Last year, I shared how, for the first time, I felt like I could genuinely relate to the mourning on Tisha B'Av. Growing up in America, the persecutions described in the Kinot felt like chapters from ancient history books — too abstract to feel real. I learned about the tragedies, fasted on Tisha B'Av, tried to imagine, but it felt distant.

Then came October 7th, and suddenly Tisha B'Av felt different. The terror that shook Israel shook all of us. The wave of antisemitism that surged in its aftermath made the pain and vulnerability of Tisha B'Av palpable and real.

That was last year. And this year? In many ways it has only gotten darker.

What felt like a warning sign became a brutal reality. In Boulder, Colorado, a man targeted a group of Jews marching for the hostages, attacking them and injuring many — including a Holocaust survivor. In Washington, D.C., two Israeli diplomats were gunned down simply for representing the Jewish state. Meanwhile, across the globe, as I write this, Iran continues to launch wave after wave of missiles — killing and injuring so many of our brothers and sisters in Israel.

And it's not just the violence. It's the isolation. The silence, and in many cases, complicity, from spaces and people we once trusted. From the left and the right, from academia and politics,

It is summertime, a time to feel at ease, a time to enjoy. Remember your fluid intake, remember skin protection, but also remember to get some of that sunshine. Come join us for minyan! We love to see everybody, weekdays and Shabbat. We do need our gentlemen coming regularly for minyan, sadly plenty of yahrzeits to remember over the summer. And don't look now, but it's just about time to start making your plans for the High Holidays...



the Jewish state and the Jewish people, our state and our people, are being pushed further to the margins.

It's a lot to carry. It's heavy.

And yet, we are still here. We are here because we as a people have learned, across countless moments of crisis throughout the generations, that when the world turns its back, we turn inward and upward. We remember who we are. We remember where we came from. We remember where we're going.

That's where we find ourselves this Tisha B'Av. Hurt, but not defeated. Injured, but not broken. Attacked, but not ashamed.

Yes we carry the weight of heartbreak, fear and isolation. But we also carry within us the strength of a people who have refused to disappear for millennia. We have felt the sting of abandonment and betrayal, yet still we cling to each other, and to the flame that no enemy has ever extinguished, or ever will.

May this be the year when Tisha B'Av becomes a day not of fasting, but of celebration; when we stand together in a rebuilt Jerusalem, united and proud.

But if indeed, we are still in the exile on Tisha B'av, then let us remind ourselves that while we mourn, we also remember resilience and belonging. We remember that our story doesn't end with tragedy, doesn't end with heartbreak, doesn't end with fear. It is a story that leads to rebuilding and to renewal for us and all of Klal Yisrael.

Tu 'BAv

The 15th of Av (known as Tu B'Av) is a most mysterious day, celebrated this year on August 9, 2025. A search of the Shulchan Aruch (Code of Jewish Law) reveals no observances or customs for this date, except for the instruction that the *tachanun* (confession of sins) and similar portions should be omitted from the daily prayers (as is the case with all festive dates), and that one should increase one's study of Torah, since the nights are beginning to grow longer, and "the night was created for study."

The Talmud tells us that many years ago the "daughters of Jerusalem would go dance in the vineyards" on the 15th of Av, and "whoever did not have a wife would go there" to find himself a bride. And the Talmud considers this the greatest festival of the year, with Yom Kippur (!) a close second!
