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Rabbi Meyers' Message

This is the time of year when so many of us are tuned in to the Judaism channel.

We're getting ready for the High Holidays; spiritually, emotionally, and logistically. We're purchasing our seats, renewing our memberships. We're buying new ties, new dresses, new suits. We're reviewing recipes, mapping out meals, planning menus. It's a lot.

And all of that effort, all of that preparation, is more than just habit. It's a demonstration; a powerful sign of how deeply our Judaism matters to us.

And that's amazing. It really is.

But this year, I want to make a small request.

Come one more day.

Come to shul one more day than you usually do.

If you usually come for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, add a day of Sukkot. Sit in the Sukkah, shake a Lulav, have a L'chaim.

Come for Shemini Atzeret, for our communal Yizkor for October 7th. This is our generation's "never forget". It is frightening how important this Yizkor is in a world that seeks once again to deny and devalue Jewish blood.

Come for Simchat Torah, when we sing and dance and celebrate with the Torah. Being Jewish is not just about mourning

or feeling guilt. Joy and celebration are a crucial part of Judaism. Being Jewish is *Geshmak*. Simchat Torah is the day to feel it.

Come for a Shabbat. Any Shabbat. We have an enjoyable and meaningful time every single week in shul — with davening, with Torah, with each other, and of course with good food.

Already a Shabbat and Yom Tov regular? Come during the week. The shul is open seven days a week. Plenty of minyanim to attend, pick one.

Join one of our many learning programs available on a regular basis. Mishmar, FAB Shiurim and more. There are so many opportunities to increase your participation.


And if you already do ALL of that, maybe this is the year you bring someone else along.



Babysitting will be offered in the playroom for children through age 5.


Hours will be 10am–12:30pm on both days of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur as well as during Kol Nidre and Neilah.

Please do not use the parking lots of local businesses during the High Holidays, including the lot on Touhy. You could be towed away.










Sukkah Going Up

Off the Subject

It was Rosh Hashanah morning, and the Rabbi noticed little Adam was staring up at the large plaque that hung in the foyer of the synagogue. It was covered with names, and small American flags were mounted on either side of it. The seven-year old had been staring at the plaque for some time, so the Rabbi walked up, stood beside the boy, and said quietly,

"Good morning, Adam."

"Good morning, Rabbi," replied the youngster, still focused on the plaque.

Finally, Adam asked, "Rabbi, what is this?"

"Well, it's a memorial to all the men and women who died in the service."

Soberly, they stood together, staring at the large plaque.

Adam's voice was barely audible when he asked: "Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur?"

Itzik worked at the main branch of the Jerusalem post office and on his shift in the sorting department he came across an unstamped, poorly hand-written envelope, addressed to "Hashem."

He opened it and discovered that it was from an elderly lady, Shifra Smadar, who was distressed because all her savings, \$200, has been stolen. Unless there's a miracle, she will be cold & hungry this Rosh Hashanah.


The letter struck a chord with Itzik who got the other postal workers together, and they came up with \$180 to donate to her. They sent it by special courier the next morning.


A week later, Itzik was again in the sorting department and he recognized the same handwriting on another envelope. He opened it:

"Dear Hashem:

Thank you for the \$180 for Rosh Hashanah. That was a real miracle!

P.S. It was \$20 short but that was probably the workers at the Post Office.




